All parents and children are welcome to join us at Killerton to see our wonderful banner. Children in Year 5 and 6 will participate in the march.

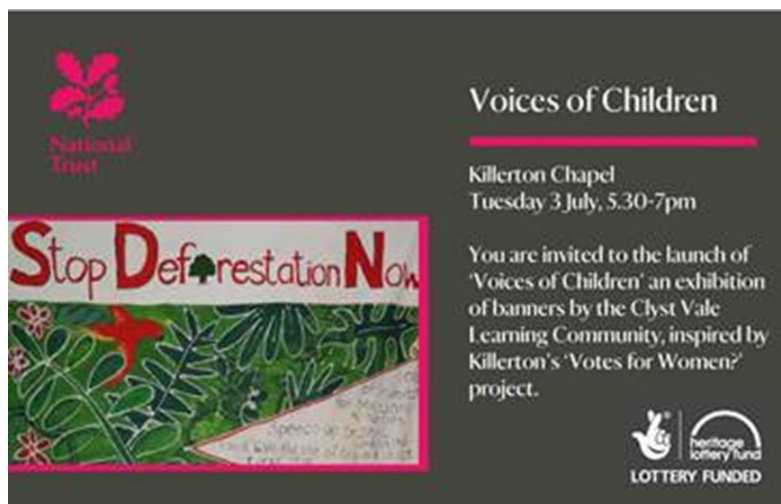

Neighbours of the Earth

Deforestation: We were very keen to use colour in this banner and wanted the message of hope to come across in the various shades of green, much like the suffragettes 100 years ago.

Poaching: the main focus of this banner is the emblem of the baby elephant and its mother. If we were to expand this campaign further, this would be a central part of the marketing.

Voices of Children

The seven schools that make up Clyst Vale Learning Community have been working in partnership with Killerton to create banners and sculptures inspired by 'Votes for Women?', the exhibition currently on display in Killerton house.

'Votes for Women?' tells the story of the campaigning that took place at Killerton in the lead up to the passing of the 1918 Representation of the People Act. The act gave the vote to all men over the age of 21 and women over the age of 30, who met certain property criteria.

Two hundred and sixty seven pupils took part in workshops at Killerton where they learnt about the campaigns for both women's and men's right to vote and investigated the early use of political branding adopted by the women's suffrage movement.

Pupils applied the lessons they had learned about the suffragettes' use of colour, emblems and symbols to create a campaign banner or sculpture inspired by the women's campaign for the right to vote or a cause of their choice.

'Although a local issue, the children understand that getting involved in a cause, they can help change the world around them. Small actions can have a great impact. They can see that votes for women needed participation and collective action to bring about change' Peter Grierson, yr 6 teacher, Stoke Canon Primary School

The year 5 children at Broadclyst Primary School have created a hanging sculpture capturing the spirit of the Suffragette movement. The children were inspired by the quote

"I would rather be a rebel than a slave" By Emmeline Pankhurst,

The bird has been released from its cage and now, a free animal, it is equal to wild birds, dictating its own future and depending only on itself.

The bird is adorned in the purple and green colours of the suffragette movement. Hanging underneath the bird is the remnants of its caged life; a cascade of feathers and on each feather a word to describe the characteristics of these women and the movement they were fighting for.

Athletics at Clyst Vale

In the heat of Wednesday afternoon 8 children from across Key Stage 2 were taken to represent Whimple in an athletics competition. The competition involved children from schools across our local learning community. In all, 6 teams took part. All children took part in a long distance and relay race. The other events included long jump, high jump, rounders ball throw, short sprint and 600m race. For these events competitors were selected on age and gender - Year 3/4 girl/boy and Year 5/6 girl/boy.

All the children involved had never participated in activities like the high and long jump before so it was a great experience. Well done to all those who took part, a brilliant team spirit throughout!
