Federation News from Mr Jolliffe



Yesterday and today, we celebrated World Book Day and it is always a pleasure to see so many children taking part in this event

in their own way. World Book Day was created by UNESCO in 1995 as a worldwide celebration to promote the enjoyment of books and reading and over 100 countries have taken part in WBS since then. The first World Book Day took place in the UK in 1997 and has taken place almost every year on the first Thursday in March ever since. The message of World Book Day is the same today as it was then, that reading is fun, accessible, exciting and has the power to transform lives. Children are more likely to enjoy reading when they have greater control over what they read and when there is an emphasis on fun and in school, children have lots of opportunities to do this. I really enjoyed sharing the Picture News assembly with children at Silverton School on Monday and hearing about all the children's favourite books and their plans for costumes or badges for Thursday. Although I wasn't working in the federation schools on Thursday, I did hear about what each school was doing and saw some pictures of children dressed up, as well as seeing lots of children walking to school in costumes at an Exeter school. I know that finding a costume or theme can be a challenge for parents as well, so thank you for sharing in this opportunity to celebrate books and the opportunities that they give children to explore our world, experience the wonders of imaginative worlds and learn about other cultures and begin to understand that life is not the same for everyone.

Which walking and cycling routes do you think should be the priority?

We're asking residents to give their views on two plans that set out our ambitions to improve walking and cycling facilities in the Clyst Valley and parts of Mid Devon over the next 10 to 20 years.

The plans have been developed to show which routes we think should be prioritised when funding becomes available, for instance from the Government or from housing developers.

One <u>plan focuses on Cullompton and Tiverton</u> and has been developed in partnership with Mid Devon District Council. The second plan includes a 50km <u>route covering the Clyst Valley</u> and has been developed in partnership with East Devon District Council.
