#### **Roman Helmets**

We have thoroughly enjoyed learning all about the Romans this term. We decided to use our DT topic of turning something from 2D to 3D, to make Roman helmets.

After designing the helmet, we used paper-mache on a balloon, to create the base of our helmet. We used some white paper to cover the newspaper to make it

easier to paint. Then we decided on some exciting colours to bring our helmets to life.

We were all surprised how well they have turned out and it was super easy to trim them down to make them look even better.











#### Stop- Start Animation

In our computing lessons, we explored stop-start animation to learn more about how this form of creation is still used today, in programmes such as Postman Pat and Wallace and Gromit. We created our own using the IPads and linked all the photos together to create a short animation. The animations consisted of: a goal being scored, a running race, a space launch, an under the sea quarrel, a superhero save and



soldiers fighting. We had to be careful, slow and patient when creating our pieces.

# **Beech Class**

It has been a busy half term in Beech Class and the pupils have been working hard across all subjects of the curriculum. We would like to praise them all for staying positive and developing more independence during this time.

In Art, the pupils have been studying an abstract painter, Yvonne Coomber, who lives in Devon. They were intrigued to find out that she mixes unique colours for each painting and uses varied ways of applying the paint when creating a landscapes. Pupils were keen to learn more about her daily life and inspirations - travelling across the world. Then they experimented with mixing autumnal colours, using watercolour paints, and seeing how lighter and darker shades could be achieved. Pupils also tried painting with different sized brushes as well to see which effects they liked the best. Finally, they painted some bold, colourful and abstract autumn landscapes.



Earlier this term, on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> November, one of the Lyme Bay Fisheries members came to talk to the pupils in Beech Class. Gavin was a newly retired fisherman and he was very knowledgeable about lots of marine creatures and about the importance of sustainable fishing to keep stocks of species at healthy levels.



He showed some interesting slides and fascinating film clips of life on the ocean floor. Later in his workshop, he encouraged the pupils to participate in different activities to check whether certain sizes of fish, crustaceans and shellfish should be put back into the sea or taken to market to be sold.





The pupils in Beech Class really enjoyed donating to Children in Need and taking part in a circuit of different physical activities in the hall in groups. They challenged themselves to keep going on each activity even if they became hot, tired and thirsty which was great to see. Well done to all.









In Design and Technology this term, Beech Class have designed, made and evaluated Elf shoe. They needed to use their cutting and sewing skills to create their Elf shoe. Pupils showed creativity, resilience and were resourceful when making their shoe and we think that they have all done a great job.



# Ash Class

Ash Class have really enjoyed learning about the life and work of children's poet, Michael Rosen in Literacy. Some children have been finding examples of his work in our library and even brought in examples from home to share with the class. After looking for patterns and rhymes in lots of his poems, the children then had a go at writing their own rhyming poems about different emotions.



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Ash Class listened extremely well to Julia from the Devon and Somerset Fire Service when she came to talk to them about fire safety at home. They were able to answer lots of questions about how to keep themselves safe and enjoyed demonstrating the Stop, Drop and Roll.



To round off our Great Fire of London topic, we created these collages in Art. We used tissue paper for the fiery backgrounds and added black strips to the white houses to make them look like the Tudor style houses of the time. They looked very effective when put together for the classroom display.



In Geography, we have been learning about the four countries of the United Kingdom and their capital cities. This sorting activity helped us to explore some of the characteristics of each country. We found out about special traditions, important landmarks, national emblems, saints and flags.



# Elm Class

What a busy term! We have been lucky to have lots of visitors this term for our 'People Who Help Us' topic. We learnt about the jobs of farmers, doctors and physiotherapists.





We enjoyed a circuits session on Children in Need Day run by some of Beech class. The children did really well at the one minute exercises!







In Science, we have been learning about the seasons. The children enjoyed using the Autumn objects they had collected to make some pictures and patterns. They worked collaboratively in their team groups and were proud of their creations.











We have also been exploring the weather. The Reception children have enjoyed using windmills and windsocks to find out if it is a windy day. The Year 1 children have made their own windsocks and spinners to measure the direction and strength of the wind. We have also been investigating shadows and finding out how shadows are formed. We made our own stick.







# Year 5 Sleepover

The children arrived and set up their beds for the night. They then walked over to the orchard.



Hot chocolate and toasted marshmallows were shared around a campfire before heading back to the hall for some activities and a film. A good time was had by all and everyone got some sleep!



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
