

Beech Class Autumn Work

Linked to their study this term of the Vikings (Norse men), pupils from Beech Class have spent time during Forest School time making Anglo-Saxon villages and representing key features of them using natural materials. While making their villages in small groups, they thought about defence strategies, food production, water sources and how to store items for trading. At the end of their making time, members from each group talked about how they had created their village.











During another of their Forest School sessions, Beech Class carried out an apple pick and worked well together in pairs and small groups to fill several sacks. It was a lovely autumn afternoon and later on everyone sat around the camp fire and enjoyed a well-earned cup of hot chocolate.













In an Art lesson recently, pupils in Beech Class have also done some designing and colour mixing when producing some paintings and mixed media pieces of work which have been inspired by the coming of

Oak class have settled well into the school routine and are all working hard to show their fabulous knowledge and skills.


On a lovely sunny day, we thoroughly enjoyed working as a team to collect lots of apples. We realised how much we could achieve together.

at retelling the stories of the beasties and eventually created their own imaginative story.


We loved reading some of our pieces of writing in class.
