Hopefully, these acorns will turn into saplings and will be ready for planting in a local community area. This is part of a project with Woodland Trust and East Devon District Council.



Throughout the afternoon the children also found lots of different leaves and used these to identify certain trees. The year 3s were fantastic at seeking out all the different insects around the forest and we were lucky enough to have two guides with us, who could answer all the questions we had.

Visit to the Mandir at Diwali

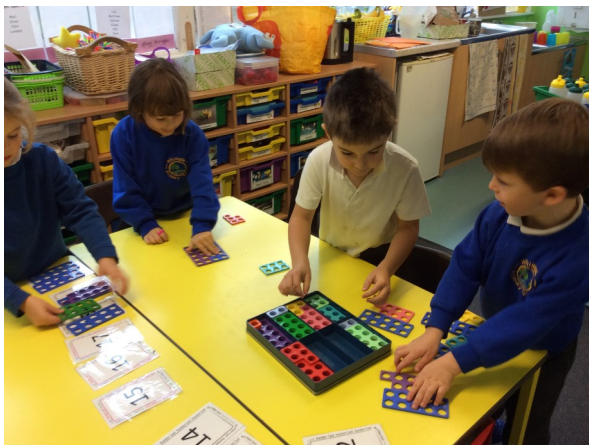

We role-played the ceremony that happens in the Mandir called Puja. In this ceremony the priest tips food and water over the gods and goddesses. They also sing and cleanse smoke over them. Later on the people line up to have Tilak from the priest put on their fore head.

We found it really interesting learning about what it would be like to visit a Mandir and be a Hindu!
