Computing Experience for Year 6 Girls





Wassail

On Thursday, the 9th of January, the pupils of K52 went up to the hall to learn more about wassailing and we learnt lots of things. In the olden days, people in Whimple completely relied on the land and the annual crop of apples, they tried to ensure a successful harvest by doing the Wassail which includes a song, noise, two wassail queens and an enthusiastic audience.





When the history of Wassail had been explained Jim Causley, with his red accordion, and Mrs Palmer, with her silver tin whistle, led us down to the orchard to practise wassailing.
