Religious Education

During the last half term, years 2, 3 and 4 have studied the importance of Moses and the Passover Festival for Jewish people.





They looked at celebration food, which led to how the Seder plate at the Passover meal tells the story of how the Israelites were finally able to leave slavery in Egypt. The gruesome ten plagues was a favourite. How many can they remember?

Historical and Geographical Enquiry

Beech Class interviewed Mrs Clapp about her experiences over the years, as a village resident, of using the Whimple station and railway line. She remembered the station having two platforms and a footbridge linking one to the other. She could also recall going into what is now someone's house to buy her train ticket and she really enjoyed her first ever train journey from Whimple to Exeter. The pupils asked her lots of questions and gained lots of information too. It was great fun to compare the station area now with how it was in the past.

Mathematics across the school.

If you mention maths lessons to adults it is a bit like marmite - you either love it or hate it! Here at school we try to ensure we make our lessons engaging and purposeful. You may not realise how much maths you actually use in one day.





Willow class have been learning about ratio, to apply these skills in a relevant context they were given a cookie recipe and had to calculate the required amount of ingredients. Some interesting mixes were made but unsurprisingly all cookies were consumed!





The children in Ash class have been exploring halving and doubling using


a selection of resources like multilink and money to support their learning.

Experimenting to find which material would the keep snowman frozen for longest.


The selected materials were compared with cotton wool working the best.

Forest School - Making Nest Boxes with Year 4

Fantastic Friday's for the year 4s has involved converting measurements, measuring accurately, sawing, drilling, screwing and hammering to make bird boxes for the orchard. Working in teams they needed resilience and resourcefulness to complete their box.











Crafting - Embroidery Skills with Year 3

The children spent four weeks learning the skill of needle threading and then designing squares and bookmarks using a selection of stitches including running and cross-stitch. One even tried a bit of chain stitch. They were all surprised by what they could achieve whilst developing their sewing skills and improving concentration and resilience. A lovely relaxing time was had by all.






Art Skills
