'See What I See' asks five to 16year olds to set their imaginations free and re-think their built environment

Competition launched in partnership with Bath Spa University and the Royal Fine Art Commission Trust

A new competition for five to 16-year olds has been launched today to help children feel more connected to the outside world during the coronavirus lockdown.

See What I see, which has been created by the Royal Fine Art Commission Trust (RFACT) in partnership with Bath Spa University, asks children to think about what they miss most about their built environment, how it might be redesigned to bring people together and which place or building they'll visit first once coronavirus restrictions have been lifted.

The competition activities have been designed for different age groups, each with a monetary prize attached (first prize ± 600 , second prize ± 300 and third prize ± 100).

Increasing Your Skills for Free - More Than 100 Free Courses

More than 100 free online courses developed by Learn Devon as part of Devon County Council's response to the coronavirus pandemic are available from Friday 1 May.

The online courses cover three main subject areas - employability, wellbeing and digital skills. Learn Devon provides adult and community learning courses on behalf of Devon County Council. The registered training provider has devised the new online learning courses to support people who may have been made redundant or are currently seeking work.

There are also online courses that have been designed for vulnerable people currently self-isolating, volunteers supporting Devon County Council during the pandemic, as well as local businesses.
