Elm Class

The day usually starts with 'Funky Finger' activities - these activities are designed to help support fine motor skills which helps to develop their fingers to aid writing.

In literacy children have continued to work on learning their sounds to support reading - this includes a whole range of daily tasks including using their new interactive board to read and sort real and fake words.





Children have been reading 'Where's Wally?' The unit has focused on following instructions in order to write their own. Activities have included making playdough and their own sandwiches. Tasks linked to the text also got them making their own hats, T-shirts and binoculars.





Science has continued work on materials - here children are testing linked to waterproofing.

Since March 8th, all the pupils in Beech Class have been busy learning more about how to survive the climate, plants and animals of Amazon rainforest. They have used their art skills to make Jungle Journals to write in and also spent time in the orchard area, using the new tarpaulins and ropes, to build shelters. Everyone worked well in their groups and enjoyed themselves while also gaining some

new skills.









Some pupils from Beech and Willow classes have also been involved in planting up two large pots with lots of Bee friendly plants so that these can be displayed as part of the Bee Positive project. We hope that everyone walking past the school gates, during the Easter Holiday, enjoys seeing the lovely plants and hopefully they will also attract lots of local

bees soon as well.







Finally, all the pupils have worked really hard and shown resilience when designing, making and evaluating a pencil case. They selected their own pieces of coloured felt, learned how to sew on a button, created a buttonhole and many pupils also added some extra decorations too. We are really pleased with their imaginative and colourful outcomes.




















Willow Class

In our writing, we have been thinking about the presentation of our work and trying really hard to master our handwriting style. Don't these pieces look great?











Oak Class








Maths has included some work on shape and looking at the many properties of shape alongside some simple investigations.





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
