### Key Stage One Science (Year 1 and 2)

Year 1 went on a materials hunt around the school. They thought about what different materials were like and went to find objects made from each material. They then categorised their findings





Even before the snow arrived, the children were exploring ways to melt ice. With their little snowmen they had to try different materials to find out which would keep the snowman frozen for longest. Materials liked cotton wool, bubble wrap, foil, fabric and paper were compared. The children were surprised to find that cotton wool worked the best. All these experiences then were used to develop their snowman stories in their literacy sessions (More on materials in next months issue).

#### Computing

Earlier this term, the children in Year Six had a visitor from Exeter College who brought some computers in to school... to be taken apart! The children learned about the different components and how to stay safe when working with electrical hardware.
