### Recycling workshop

Elm, Ash and Oak were lucky enough to have a workshop from Resource Futures, all about understanding the 3Rs (Reduce, Reuse and Recycle) and how these are important in our home and school life. This fascinating workshop considered the natural resources used to make everyday items and the new objects that these can be recycled into. The children found it challenging to figure out whether the items they had in their bag were reusable, and if they were reusable what could they be made into. All the different things the reusable materials could be made into really surprised the children and made them more aware of the reasons why we recycle. The children ended the workshop with a challenge to figure out



what the reusable material could be made into, they had to think about the everyday materials they see and how some of these are actually made of the same materials but are used in different ways.

around them.














# Design Technology and Art in Ash Class

For their design and technology this term, the children have had to design and make their own vehicle. Part of the design process involved learning about the parts of the vehicle so they could plan and build their own chassis. After completing their structure they could then add details like windows and lights to finish it off.











In art children have been learning about the artist Kandinsky. They were inspired by his painting called Concentric Circles and chose a 2D shape to create their own.





#### Science Visit

A hydrologist came to visit Beech Class on Tuesday 17th March. We learnt about natural and manmade methods for reducing flooding and came up with our own plans to prevent flooding of a town and nature reserve habitat. The children came up with some interesting and unusual ideas of what to do with redirected water, including a water theme play park and otter reserve. Thanks very much to Jess Dunston for her time.

#### Science Club

Science club returned this half term with another group of keen investigators. We explored the link with food and science- how colour perception affects taste and experimenting with custard powder; engineered marshmallow shooters and towers; understood how winds develop using anemometers and making kites. Finally Beech classroom got very sticky as the children tried to make different shape bubbles and discovered how many "bubbles in a bubble" they

could carefully blow.
