 Welcome (and welcome back) to Oak! I'm looking forward to getting to know you all and starting a great year of learning and fun in Oak Class. The children have made a great start to the year and are ready for the challenges ahead!

English <ul style="list-style-type: none"> To use "Grammarsaurus" to help understand the important features of writing. To begin writing fictional stories that contain correct punctuation and grammar along with new and exciting vocabulary from the Year 3/4 curriculum. Unit based on the story 'The Beasties' by Jenny Nimmo and Gwen Millward. To write an information text based on 'An Anthology of Intriguing Animals' by Ben Hoare, focusing on features of non-fiction writing. Using the features of non-fiction writing to write about the lives of people in the Iron Age. Sharing class novels together, starting with the book 'Spacebaby' by Henrietta Brandford. <p>What's the one thing we can do at home to support?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Read with your child every day for 5-10 minutes. There is extensive evidence to show that reading to, and listening to children read has significant impacts on their learning across the curriculum. 	
Maths <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Place value: Comparing and ordering numbers on a number line and understanding what each digit represents. Addition and subtraction strategies. Fractions: Doubling, halving and the concept of a half. We will also be finding fractions of amounts whilst understanding what a fraction is. Working on our Number Sense programme to build a secure foundation for multiplication in the Spring term. <p>What's the one thing we can do at home to support?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Year 4 children will be having regular times table testing ready for the Multiplication Tables Check in the Summer term. We will be continuing to learn the rest of the key facts for multiplication and division. Completing some activities on 'Doodle Maths' each week.

Interpret a range of evidence to generate reasons, and then explain, why Iron Age Britain was often a violent time. Describe who Boudica was and explain why she fought the Romans.
