Curriculum Newsletter for Whimple Primary School March 2024

Welcome to our half-termly curriculum newsletter. It is not until I compile these newsletters that I really appreciate what an amazing variety of subjects, tasks and activities that we are providing for our children on a weekly basis. Whimple pupils are very lucky to have such a hard-working and dedicated staff, and I would like to thank them all for their time and dedication to the role - it is not always easy. As at the end of the autumn term, there is a separate newsletter which includes a raft of photographs for some whole school events and the Year 5 residential. Further examples of what we have managed to fit in over the past 6 weeks.







Beech Class

In Art, we spent time painting our coil pots and then we moved on to apply our joining, rolling, attaching and smoothing skills in another way. We designed and sculpted an animal or creature,





adding embellishments to the surface of the clay -either by adding texture or creating it with tools. We are pleased with our results and here are some of them for you to look at.



This half term, Beech Class have also studied the artwork of writer and illustrator Marc Martin. He is the creator of a fantastic book called The River. We have been inspired by his work and then gone on to layer, weave and combine different textile pieces to produce eye-catching and textured landscapes.

These already look brilliant but we are soon add going to pieces plaited, of and knotted twisted fabric wool or to additional create interest.

In RE lessons, we have been studying aspects of Judaism, including the Seder Plate. This is

the Seder Plate. This is a really important part of the meal that takes place the evening before the Passover festival begins. We learned about what each item on the Seder Plate represents, leaned to the left to respect royalty and remembered the 10 plagues that were also endured. We also talked about the importance for Jews of having family time and learning about the history and traditions of their faith. Some of us



tried some of the matzah flatbreads, lettuce, parsley and charoset (a mixture of apple and spices).











Beech class has had a busy term this Spring. We've been learning about electricity and using this knowledge in our DT to make a steady hand game. The children have made some tricky activities to try with their families at home.



We've been writing about apple production over the years and have had an interesting trip to Whimple Heritage Centre with a talk from Mrs and Mr Smith about Whiteways and the factory here in Whimple. We explored the artefacts and watched an old fashioned Wassail that was a bit raucous.









Elm Class

As part of our Science learning we had a visit from a member of the team at Devon Waste, who explained to the children what happens to all of our rubbish and recycling. After learning about making compost, the children used their observation skills to find and identify minibeasts in the compost. They also planted some seeds in some compost which they have been looking after in class.





As part of our Plants topic we have been finding out about seeds, seed dispersal and what plants need to grow. We have observed plants in the school garden and learnt the names for the different parts of a flowering plant.





In Art we have been learning about the technique 'printing'. We enjoyed exploring the shapes and prints that different objects made. We then drew castles linked to our topic on polystyrene foam and printed with paint and rollers onto paper.



In maths we have been learning about money and time. The children were really good at finding different ways to make amounts when visiting our 'shop'.

Last week we took part in the 'Great British Spring Clean'. The children enjoyed using the litter pickers and did a great job of tidying up our playgrounds and outside area.







Ash Class

In Science, we have been learning all about plant life cycles by finding out about seeds and bulbs. We learnt about seed dispersal and had fun making sycamore seed helicopters out of paper. We investigated how many seeds are inside different fruits and observed the conditions needed to help our cress seeds germinate and grow successfully. We have also been fascinated to watch our Harlequin flower bulbs transform over the past few weeks by measuring our shoots and keeping a weekly record.



















The rain didn't dampen our enthusiasm to do a litter pick around our orchard and village playground for The Great British Spring Clean. Afterwards, the children designed their own fantastic posters to encourage people to dispose of their litter by following the 4 Rs Reduce, Repair, Reuse and Recycle. Great work Ash Class!







We have been exploring printing in art this half term. We used a range of classroom objects to experiment with, trying out different techniques and repeating patterns. We looked at the work of Orla Kiely and the prints that she has created for household items such as cushions, containers, curtains, crockery and even wallpaper! We then used her designs as inspiration for our own. We created some repeating patterns using polystyrene tiles and printing ink. It was









In computing, Year 1 have been learning how to use a range of tools using Purple Mash, 2Paint whilst the Year 2s have been using algorithms to program BeeBots and spot the errors by debugging.







In maths, we have been learning about different measures. We had to estimate, compare, and measure the capacity of a variety of

Science-Light

In science, we have been learning all about light. In the last few weeks we have focussed on shadows and how they are created. We have learnt the meaning of the words, transparent, translucent and opaque and now understand how opaque objects make very clear

shadows. We took time to plan an investigation where we could explore shadows more. We found that the further the light source from the object, the smaller the shadow.





DT- Desk tidies

In DT we took the time to do some research around what makes a useful and effective desk tidy. We then decided who we wanted to make our desk tidies for and used that information to think about the features our project needed.



We tried our best to use recycled materials to produce the final piece, ensuring they looked interesting and effective. Here are some of our final products.



Geography- Earthquake and the link to volcanoes

In geography, we have been learning all about earthquakes and how they are formed. This half term we spotted a familiarity between where earthquakes and volcanoes were happening. We discovered that it was due to plates underground and we used drama to act out the development of a volcano, whilst sharing our understanding of how this links to other natural disasters.
